Section A

Question 01

Identify the original text of the following extracts and comment on them with specialreference to theme, techniques and language.(5x4 - 20 Marks)

- I. A land of streams! Some, like a downward smoke, Slow-dropping veils of thinnest lawn, did go; And some thro' wavering lights and shadows broke, Rolling a slumberous sheet of foam below.
- II. But still moves delight,
 Like clear springs renew'd by flowing,
 Ever perfect, ever in them Selves eternal.
- III. She rattled on cheerfully about the shooting and the scarcity of birds, and the prospects for duck in the winter. To Framton it was all purely horrible. He made a desperate but only partially successful effort to turn the talk on to a less ghastly topic, he was conscious that his hostess was giving him only a fragment of her attention, and her eyes were constantly straying past him to the open window and the lawn beyond. It was certainly an unfortunate coincidence that he should have paid his visit on this tragic anniversary.

Question 03

Discuss the salient features of metaphysical poetry in Andrew Marvell's <u>'To his Coy</u> <u>Mistress</u>'. (20 marks)

Question 04

Critically review John Dryden's satirical portrayal of the Duke of Buckingham in the extract **Portrait of Zimri** from the political allegory <u>'Absalom and Achitophel'</u>. (20 marks)

Question 05

"The disloyal woman pays dearly for her greed". Discuss this statement with reference to the ballad, '<u>Demon Lover'.</u> (20 marks)

Section C- Short Story

Question 05

The short story, **'<u>The Open Window'</u>**, demonstrates a mischievous sense of humor that Saki's tales are well known for. Comment. (20 marks)

Question 06

The short story, <u>'Uncle Ernest'</u> by Allan Sillitoe, illustrates the victimization his characters often face. It chronicles a too-ready acceptance of the larger society's interference and power. How far do you agree? Justify your answer. (20 marks)

Section D- Novel

Question 07

The Novel, <u>'Great Expectations'</u> illustrates the difference between social prestige and moral worth. Comment on this statement with reference to Charles Dickens' Character Pip in Great Expectations. (20 marks)

Question 08

Critically analyze the use of symbolism as a dominant technique in William Golding's novel, 'Lord of the Flies'. (20 marks)
